

Cáitlín Burke

Praised by the N.Y. Times for having “virtuoso flair”, and the ability to create “three-dimensional characters”, multi-talented artist, Cáitlín Burke's career has spanned the genres of Broadway, theatre, opera, and classical music. She most recently appeared, to critical acclaim, as The Mother Abbess at The Kennedy Center on the national tour of *The Sound of Music*, directed by three-time Tony award winner, Jack O'Brien.

Internationally, she was the first American to tour with London's National Gilbert and Sullivan Opera Company, where she appeared at England's Royal Hall, as well as prestigious venues across the U.K., Italy, and Germany, including rave reviews for her work in the U.K. at The International Gilbert & Sullivan Festival. She has frequently appeared as a principal artist at Lincoln Center, New York City Center, Symphony Space, the 92nd Street Y, The Times Center, and regionally at The Kennedy Center, The Filene Center at Wolf Trap, The Ahmanson Theatre, North Shore Music Theatre, and Meadow Brook Theatre. Her stage work includes the regional premiere of *Avenue Q* (Best Supporting Actress Award), *The King and I*, *South Pacific*, *Into the Woods*, *Bittersweet*, *Master Class*, *By Jeeves* (Wilde Award nomination), *M. Butterfly*, *The Miracle Worker*, *The House of Murgatroyd*, and 10 seasons as a principal artist with The New York Gilbert and Sullivan players appearing in 11 Gilbert and Sullivan operettas.

Her concert work includes guest artist appearances with the U.K.'s National Festival Orchestra, the Columbus Symphony Orchestra, the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, the Rochester Symphony Orchestra, the Chattanooga Symphony, the Oakland Symphony, and the Detroit Chamber Winds. She is the recipient of the David Daniels artist award, the Elizabeth Gardner vocal award, Charlotte Ruppel vocal award, and was the first person to be honored with two Matilda Awards for Alumni Achievement in both Music and Theatre from Oakland University, where she received her bachelors degree before attending graduate school at Indiana University.
